

## THE UNSEEN INDIAN CINEMA

Each year, the New York Indian Film Festival team views more than 200 films to build a line-up of important cinematic works that have never been screened in the New York Tristate area. P Rajendran takes a look at what NYIFF is offering this year.




ixteen years ago, the first iteration of the New York Indian Film Festival got going with 10 films, screened over five days. The festival, which is one of the many events the Indo American Arts Council, a non-profit organization, organizes to celebrate South Asian culture in the United States, has grown year on year. And this year, it boasts 45 full-length films — 35 features and five documentaries —

and 40 shorts, spread over eight days.

The highlights of NYIFF this year include Nachom-ia-Kumpasar, a Konkani film to be screened on the opening night May 7; Highway, which is the centerpiece of the festival; with Aligarh on the closing night May 14.

The festival has also roped in Indian National Award winners — Indian cinema's highest honor — including the documentary A Far Afternoon, Birds With Large Win-



gs, based on an environmental disaster; and  $The\ River\ of\ Fables\ (Kotha\ Nodi)$ , a tale of four women, based on folk stories compiled by Assamese writer Lakshminath Bezbaroa.


The documentaries include For The Love of A Man, about the quixotic excesses of Rajnikanth fans based on what they see on the screen; Life In Metaphors: A Portrait of Girish Kasaravalli, on the famed director; and Kagaz Ki Kashti (Paperboat), about ghazal singer Jagjit Singh.

The nostalgic can rely on two retrospectives.


One of them, titled 'Three Generations of Filmmakers,' is billed as a chance to revisit films of 'Indian filmmakers who married their love for art with the commercial and produced a unique brand of cinema. It also marks the 50<sup>th</sup> death anniversary of filmmaker Bimay Roy, featuring Roy's *Sujata*; his protégé and son-in-law Basu Bhattacharya's Anubhav, and Bhattacharya's son Aditya's Raakh Redux.


The other retrospective revisits famous 'Directors' First Films' — Muzzafar Ali's Gaman, Saeed Akhtar Mirza's Arvind Desai Ki Ajeeb Dastaan, and KNT Sastry's Tiladaanam. All three films were recently restored by the National Film Development Corporation of India.

Interspersed between these will be panels, sidebars and the host of shorts, some clips shot on mobile phones, and an annual feature from the New York University team led by Professor Karl Bardosh.









Mumbai Film Festival, NFDC Film Bazaar in Goa and a range of other festivals. And some films just come our way by sheer luck.

Asked about the hardest work, he said, "Our programming team watched over 200 films — that is the most challenging task. We give every film a chance, whether it is good or not."

Chhabra spoke of what he was best about this year's offerings:

"I loved the fact that we got some really strong films, including Crime Is Punishment (Tamil, by M Manikandan who made the groundbreaking Kaaka Muttai), U-Turn (Kannada), G - A Wanton Heart (Haryanvi), Kothanodi (Assamese), restored prints of (Bimal Roy's) Sujata and (Basu Bhattacharya's) Anubhav (both in Hindi) and some amazing documentaries, including For the Love of A Man.... and A Far Afternoon, about the painter Krishan Khanna. I am especially proud of our opening, closing and centrepiece." -

The NYU team has also made a film essay about the remaking of Natir Puja, Rabindranath Tagore's cinematic dance drama, based on a Buddhist legend. The original film was destroyed soon after its completion.

Another film based on literature — in this case, by Anton Chekov — is Grandpa, Village, about a child sent of to work at a firecracker factory who dreams of his village and of when his grandfather will come to take him back.

A panel discussion on regional cinema will include two representatives from Marathi films (Mohan Agashe and Umesh Kulkarni), and one each from Kannada (Pavan Kumar) and Bengali (Pratim Das Gupta). Besides dealing with funding, storytelling techniques and walking the line between seeking commercial success and critical acclaim, it will also address the resurgence of Marathi cinema.

A conversation on LGBT films from India will involve directors Jayan Cherian, David Kalal, Hansal Mehta and Willie Sankhla and try to tease out the threads within complex narratives based on different identities — nation-

A panel on animation will rely on two Oscar winners, Rahul Thakkar (Dreamworks) and Cottalango Leon (Sony Pictures), and one nominee, Sanjay Patel. The trio will discuss how they found their way into animation, emerging technologies, narrating personal stories and their journeys.

One industrial panel is to discuss film distribution at a

time when cultural barriers and traditions keep Indian film out of the American market, despite the potentially huge market. At another, Jerry Stoeffhaas and Kathryn Fisher from the New York State Governor's Office of Motion Picture and Television Development will address the

advantages of shooting films in the state, And Jorge Hernandez, director of marketing at the Mayor's Office of Media and Entertainment, is to discuss incentives, discounts, location information and general permits filmmakers need to know to shoot in the city.

"This year we added an extra day — eight days of films and conversations, the most NYIFF has ever done, with nearly 45 programs," said Aseem Chhabra, the festival director, pointing to the retrospectives.

He added, "We have a very strong line-up of regional films in various Indian languages — Assamese, Bengali, Haryanvi, Marathi, Konkani, Telugu, Kannada, Tamil and Malayalam."

According to Aroon Shivdasani, the festival's artistic and executive director, "There are several films we wanted, but could not screen even if they had given us access because of our own rules: (the films) had al-ready been screened at Tribeca or elsewhere in the Tristate area prior to our festival."

Asked about any hurdles they had to deal with, Shivdasani was unequivocal in saying that getting films was the least of the team's problems.


"Unfortunately, money is a major issue, and I'm still battling it," she said, adding that the team was still "trying to find resources to pay our bills and give both filmmakers and audiences a unique, fun, stimulating experience.

"It's an uphill battle, and I don't see a light at the end of the tunnel," she said.

Chhabra was more confident, at least about getting the

best out of what was available.

"Things work out," he said. "We have to negotiate to get some films, go after them by talking to filmmakers, producers. I go through this process every year — visiting the
